News of Friends:

Lalthla Muana of Myanmar Evangelical Friends Church is attending the World Conference, thanks to Brisbane and other Australian Friends who have donated the cost of his travel. He shares some aspects of his life and that of his village in Myanmar.

“The name of my village is Dowinchaung, located in Sagain Division, Kalay Township, and Pinkhunglay Outs. There are around 240 families; the total population is around 1300 including children. There are more than one hundred villages in Kalay Township. Our village is one of the nearest villages from Kalay Town. Almost the entire villagers are Christian, but different denominations. Most of the people are farmers and poor people. Our main food is rice with some vegetables. A single man, named Zawna is employed under the government with a small salary in our village. There is a primary school but no other Middle or High school or Kindergarten. Most of the students are attending school at Tahan after they finished primary level. There is no electric power except a small generator which is operated by a small engine as I presented with power point at the AWPS Gathering in Manila.

The main struggle with health problems around our local area is malaria. We have pure and sufficient water; almost every house has our own well. I ask you to pray that our village can have its own kindergarten. I hope and believe that it would sustain itself regarding fees from parents for teachers after the first year. Thank you very much for your concern and prayer. In Christ, *Muana*

Robert is shortly completing a term on the QUNO Geneva Committee as the AWPS representative. He was instrumental in a project in Indonesia for 12 years in conjunction with the Indonesian police and Gajah Maja University, providing teaching on non violent interventions with police and the civilian populations.

Robert also contributed to writing "*The Moral Economy*" 2009 which says "We are faced with a choice: bring the economy into right relationship with the planet and its inhabitants, or suffer the consequences; the increasing destruction of Earth's life support systems and social structures. It draws on the Quaker principle of "right relationships".

Cristina Montiel (Tina) has been welcomed into membership by Victoria Regional Meeting in Australia. Tina is a professor of Political Studies at Ateneo University in Manila and recently played an essential role at the AWPS Gathering in Manila. She regularly worships with Friends in Melbourne and it seemed right to them that she be accepted into membership of Friends there.

Rose and Raffy Gaid from Davao, the Philippines are doing a Quaker course by correspondence, through Quaker Learning Australia. Their mentor is Elizabeth Stevenson and this is providing a good learning environment.

Arvind Swan from Mid India Yearly Meeting and former clerk of AWPS was hospitalised and in the ICU for some days last month.

He had partial paralysis on the left side which is somewhat better now. He is also diabetic and has a heart condition. He is now home. His lifestyle will be affected and the constant travelling his various Quaker activities involved may have to be cut down. Please hold Arvind and his family in the Light.

Hannah Watson & Jacob Phelps from Bangkok have asked Friends to consider assisting flood victims in the Thai capital. They are both volunteering and report that food and water are in very short supply. They have put together an excellent video which can be watched at

Joon Yong An an attender at Brisbane Quaker Meeting writes: I just finished my master's course and am waiting for my PhD scholarship to continue my PhD. Recently I met someone who is doing PhD for development & aid work in the third world. Even though she's Catholic (she has sort of same perspective as me-cumenical), I want to introduce her to Quaker Friends as we share the same interest.

The other story is that I recently met a Korean pastor. I shared my story and my feelings that the Korean Church in Australia is only focusing on their interests and their business. They do not talk about important issues in Korea, including media manipulation and human rights. This pastor has the same interest. He had been studying democratic movement at university and he understood 'Minjung theory'. He was invited as pastor in a Korean church here but he was sacked due to his political and theological views. Now he has his own church, where only four people attend. I hope I might be able to share what Australian Quakers have been doing.

Update on Japan Friends: *Mamoru Hitomi* from Mito Meeting

1. It was necessary for us to find a new site for our kindergarten after March 11th. Fortunately we found it nearby and moved there on April 1st. Since then meeting for worship is held there every Sunday and the kindergarten started a new school year in April.

2. At the same time we had to think of asking for donations. The appeal was sent to Friends in Japan and overseas.
3. Donations were quickly sent from Friends and friends; parents and graduates of the kindergarten and neighbors, and overseas Friends and Friends Schools. A brick meeting house had been a town symbol for a hundred years.
4. AWPS sent donations to Japan Yearly Meeting, b some of which has been allocated to Mito for rebuilding. I was not clear who and to whom donated. So allow me to thank you now.
5. We met a reliable architectural company in Mito, who informed us that the old brick walls couldn't be used anymore, but a wooden house would be cheaper and best for proof against earthquakes. The demolition has been done, putting aside bricks which might be used partly in the memory of the old Meeting house.
6. Demolition of the kindergarten building has been done with asbestos carefully being eliminated. It will also be a wooden house. However its construction fee does NOT include your donation, but it will be paid by itself with support from local government.
7. A new plan of the meeting house will soon be shown to us. It is anticipated that a new meeting house will be finished in early summer. I would like to inform you again how it is developing.

Thank you again for your kind donation and patience these months from all of Mito Monthly Meeting.

Friends to join the great Ekta Parishad Walk in India

Kate de la Mare, outgoing Clerk of France Yearly Meeting and her husband *Sébastien* have joined the year-long preparatory march starting on 2nd October 2011 which will culminate in a great walk towards Delhi gathering about 100,000 walkers by October 2012. The walk is organised by Ekta Parishad (‘Forum for Unity’),

which federates 100s of smaller movements & organisations working for the poorest peoples to regain autonomy in their lives by asking the ‘powers-that-be’ to respect peoples’ rights to manage, at village level, their life resources – land, water and the forest. Kate and Sébastien set off from home on the 2nd October 2011, to travel overland (hitch-hiking, bus, train) expecting to meet up with this preparatory walk in India sometime during the month of November, to walk with the movement over the next few months until springtime. They have been offered places as translators at the World Conference of Friends taking place in Kenya in April 2012. “We hope our experiences will enable us to contribute to the Salt & Light theme Friends will be exploring.” Kate says.

“We intend to return to France to continue the journey over here and, in parallel with the Indian preparatory walk, to offer a time of encounter and sharing from May until October 2012. We leave for this adventure with a good network of support from family and friends especially in the neighbourhood where we live and till the earth. Our meetings towards Spirit-led community are now bearing fruit and we intend to remain closely connected to the nascent community at home throughout our travels.” says Kate, who has been with Quakers since 1994 and came to France early in 2001 to join the l’Arche movement (founded by Lanza del Vasto following his meeting with Gandhi & seeking to live out the ideal of non-violence). In 2002 Sébastien came to stay in the same community (La Borie Noble) in the south of France and in 2003 they were married in the context of a local Sufi fraternity.

Kate continues: “By early 2006 via our connections with the Celtic Orthodox church in Brittany we had been offered the use of a half-hectare of land and began to live as subsistence farmers, producing

food for ourselves and others – distributed by means of a box-scheme, and receiving benefits from the social security system. Over the years we have gradually simplified our lifestyle to reduce our dependence on money. In January 2009 we stopped receiving benefits and at Easter that year we stopped selling our produce and since that time our activity is centred on taking a fuller and more direct responsibility for our basic needs and those of the guests we receive through the World Wide Opportunities on Organic Farms – [WWOOF](#). This means growing everything we need and collecting water and firewood. All our surplus produce is simply and freely distributed amongst friends and neighbours.”

The Christchurch MM Co clerks reported on the end of an era for their Meeting in the Aotearoa New Zealand Clerks’ Letter for August: ‘Christchurch Meeting House has been placed in the residential red zone. We are still waiting for information from the government as to what this will entail financially. ‘No information has come out yet for houses, and none for churches, in which category we come for some if not all our property. ‘We had a threshing meeting to consider what the effect on the Meeting might be.

During this, it became clear that unoccupied premises were not safe from vandalism, and the Meeting House was more at risk, as

we could not lock the building. So we have hired the use of a storage facility and moved as much as we could into that.

The packing was a sad occasion and we need to find a way of recognizing the end of an era. We are still all weary, tired, and always on edge, waiting for the next aftershock. Memories are affected and we apologise for mistakes made. We can meet at Mary Potter for Meeting for Worship, arriving just after St Luke's Anglican Parish finishes their service. 'Where to next'??

This is a very big decision which will take sometime and more information before we will see the way forward. 'For now we know that our time at Cresswell Avenue needs to be laid to rest.'

If my parents go to prison, what happens to me? *Helen Kearney* from the Quaker UN Office reports on the 2011 Committee on the Rights of the Child Day of General Discussion (DGD) on children of incarcerated parents.

Children whose parents are in prison came under the UN spotlight for the first time ever this September. These children have committed no crime but are deeply affected by their parents' involvement in the criminal justice system. Almost uniquely, two under-18s (Sian Knott and Raheel Hussain, both of whom have a parent in prison) spoke at the main session of the Day of General Discussion (DGD). With an estimated 200 participants, it was the biggest to date.

"Children of prisoners are often referred to as the invisible victims of the penal system", said Oliver Robertson of the Quaker UN

Office. “*This event was an opportunity to bring them to centre stage.*”

Despite affecting millions of children worldwide – an estimated 2.8 million children a year in the USA alone – this is the first time that this neglected issue has been discussed substantively anywhere in the UN system. Alongside two prisoners’ children, experts from Brazil, Pakistan and South Africa also presented their work. Two specialist groups then discussed babies and children living with or visiting a parent in prison and children ‘left outside’.

“This is an issue where no one country or region is a clear world leader”, said Rachel Brett, Human Rights and Refugees Representative at QUNO, “The DGD was therefore a unique opportunity to share ideas with people from around the globe who have worked with children of prisoners day in, day out.”

Asia and the West Pacific were ably represented, with participants from India, Pakistan, China and Kyrgyzstan. The work of New Zealand's charity *Pillars* was shown at the event. Abdullah Khoso, a keynote speaker from children's NGO SPARC Pakistan, outlined the conditions faced by children living with mothers in prison in his country, including overcrowding, poor diet and the lack of a natural environment and space to play. Pakistani law states that children up to 6 years old may remain with their mothers in prison, although there are reports of children aged 10 and over who continue to be detained.

Overall, as the first international discussion on prisoners’ children, participants found the DGD to be invaluable. QUNO have been working on this issue since 2003 and drafted the proposal for the DGD. The expert discussion was rich and informative, with many opportunities to share good practice and learn from one another. The two working groups reported back to the plenary with a set of clear proposals and concrete recommendations. It was generally agreed that non-custodial measures (pre-trial, under-trial and sentences), such as parole, reporting, suspended sentences and community service, should be used as an alternative to

detention/prison when the offending parent is a primary carer. Although some participants expressed the need for an international standard on the age limit for infants or children living in prison the conclusion was there needed to be a case-by-case decision, taking into account each individual child, the situation of the parent (e.g. whether they are the primary carer), the conditions of the prison in which the parent is serving the sentence (e.g. whether child-friendly or otherwise), and the alternatives for the child.

The office in Geneva, which is based at Quaker House, focuses on work at the UN and other international institutions on issues related to human rights and refugees, global economics, and disarmament and peace. The office is run by a small team who share in the different dimensions of the life of QUNO.
